


## cross-border-territories.eu: the resource centre for cross-border cooperation gets a makeover!

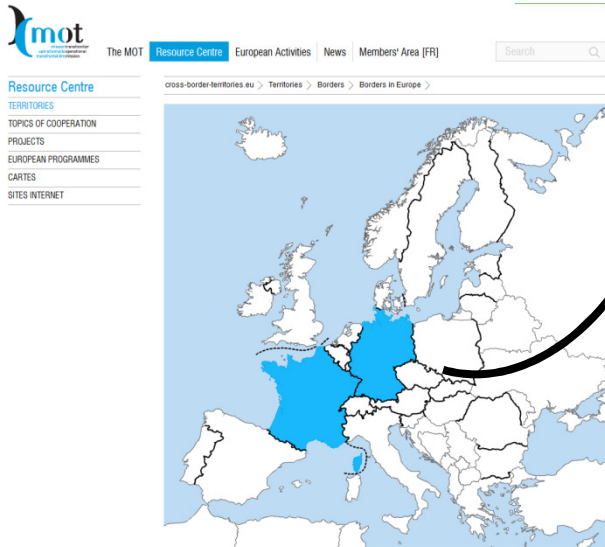

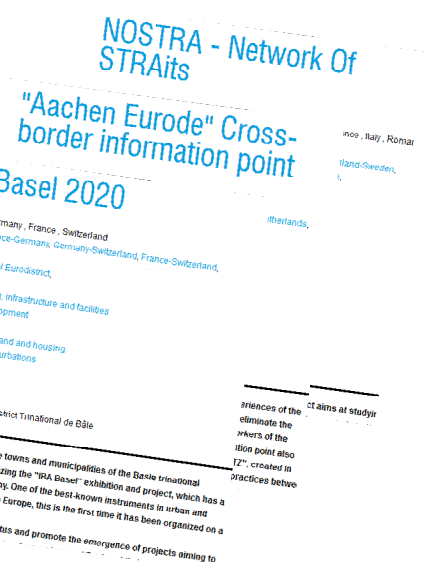

##### Introduction

The challenges of climate change and the tensions in the global energy market have led the European Union to set ambitious energy management objectives as part of the Europe 2020 strategy<sup>1</sup> and in particular to "support the transition to a low carbon economy in all sectors" within the thematic priorities for the 2014-2020 programming period.

The effective contribution of the EU funds will be needed to achieve these objectives for energy and climate, particularly the binding annual targets for reducing greenhouse gas emissions imposed on Member States for the period 2013-2020 within the framework of the Decision on the distribution of efforts (Decision No 406/2009/EC).

Border territories are faced with specific difficulties in relation to planning and differences with local, regional and national energy policy on the other side of the

### European Programmes

#### Introduction

In the 2007-2013 programming period, cohesion policy was reorganised around three objectives: Objective 1 "convergence", Objective 2 "competitiveness" and Objective 3 "European territorial cooperation". European territorial cooperation, which previously came under the Interreg Community Initiative programme, has thus become a fully-fledged objective of cohesion policy, thereby signalling the recognition of its importance by the European Union.

There are three strands to the "European territorial cooperation" objective – cross-border cooperation, transnational cooperation and interregional cooperation – and is financed by the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF).

The Lisbon Treaty, which came into force in December 2009, reinforced the legitimacy of regional and local players (subsidiarity) and of the European Union's territorial approach (territorial cohesion).

According to the Territorial Agenda 2020, which was approved in May 2011 under Hungary's presidency by the European ministers responsible for spatial planning and territorial development, territorial cooperation initiatives must be focused on long-term territorial cohesion objectives, based on the experience of the EU's Interreg initiative. Objective 3 programmes and the integrated macro-regional strategies, such as the pioneering initiatives in the Baltic-Sea and Danube regions.

#### PROGRAMMING FOR 2014-2020

For the 2014-2020 programming period, the architecture for cohesion policy will be composed of Regulations, a European strategic document, the Common Strategic Framework, national documents, Partnership Contracts, and programming documents – the Operational Programmes
